O*NET, the Occupational Information Network (www.onetcenter.org/tools.html), offers a set of self-directed career assessment tools to help you make career decisions. Available online at no fee to download for personal use or in a career center are five tools:

- O*NET Computerized Interest Profiler
- O*NET Work Importance Locator

Each assessment provides a list of related occupations that match abilities, interests, or work values.

Browse Occupations (www.CareerOneStop.org) provides national, state, and local career, education, and employment information. For example, create an occupational profile for registered nurse by selecting “Explore Careers” and then “Occupation, Browse.” The profile includes current and projected job openings both within a selected state and nationally.
