Get started exploring your options with the five simple steps below.



STEP 1: How do I identify my career interests?

Assess yourself. Assessments help you identify how your traits (such as interests, skills, and abilities) match occupations. Download ability, interest, and work importance assessments on O*NET (www.onetcenter.org/tools.html).

STEP 2: Where can I explore various careers and industries?

Visit Career Voyages (www.CareerVoyages.gov) for the latest information about careers in high-growth industries and in-demand occupations. Read *InDemand* magazine to explore careers and find tips for building a successful career (<http://careervoyages.gov/indemandmagazine-main.cfm>).



STEP 4: How do I pay for my education?

Find possible options to pay for your education at CareerOneStop (www.CareerOneStop.org). Select Education + Training for financial aid information (grants, loans, scholarships, etc.).

STEP 5: How do I gain experience?

Use the Career Exploration tool on America's Career InfoNet (<http://www.careerinfonet.org/explore/View.aspx>) to find ways to gain skills and experience, including internships and work-based learning opportunities.



STEP 3: Where do I find education options?

Select Education + Training at CareerOneStop (www.CareerOneStop.org) to explore school and program options.

Match Interests and Abilities to Jobs

O*NET, the Occupational Information Network, (www.onetcenter.org/tools.html), offers a set of self-guided career assessment tools to help you make career decisions. Available online at no fee to download for personal use or in a career center are five tools:



- O*NET Ability Profiler
- O*NET Work Importance Locator
- O*NET Interest Profiler
- O*NET Work Importance Profiler
- O*NET Computerized Interest Profiler

Each assessment provides a list of related occupations that match your abilities, interests, or work values.

Watch Career Videos

Explore Careers (www.CareerOneStop.org) provides videos for 450 careers, 23 competitive skill sets and abilities, five industries, and six different work options, including 250 in Spanish. All videos are available to view or download for no fee and may be used for personal use or training settings. Examples of the career videos include:
